ONLINE HUNTER SAFETY CLASSES

Step 1: Pay \$10 for a voucher at any location where Hunting & Fishing licenses are sold. Bring that voucher to Clinton City Rec. 1651 W 2300 N to register for field day class.

Step 2: Pay \$10 at Clinton Rec. After registration, begin online portion of course which may take 10-12 hours to complete.

Step 3: Attend field day class and range day. Bring receipt from Clinton City, voucher and all internet tests or completion certificate to field day class. **All tests must be 100% correct. BRING YOUR CASSED .22 RIFLE. NO AMMUNITION.**

- **December 10th class day / December 14 range day.**
- **January 7th class day / January 11th range day.**

Clinton City has an online pay provider - XPRESS BILL PAY. It's simple to use through an internet web browser and e-mail address. Every month you receive a reminder e-mail to let you know your bill is online. Then, log in to your account at www.clintoncity.net or XpressBillPay.com and view your bill. Select a payment type, credit card, debit card, or electronic funds transfer and enter the information; or, if you prefer, you can set up a recurring scheduled payment.

Holiday Fire Safety

Be safe when decorating for the holidays. Data from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), approx. 240 home fires involving Christmas trees and 150 home fires involving lights and other decor occur each year.

Follow simple fire safety tips to keep electric lights, candles, and Christmas trees from creating a tragedy. Learn how to prevent a fire and what to do in case a fire starts in your home. Make sure all exits are accessible and not blocked by décor.

Selecting a Tree for the Holidays

Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches; the needles should not break if the tree is freshly cut. The trunk should be sticky to the touch. Old trees can be identified by bouncing the tree trunk on the ground. If a lot of needles fall off, the tree has probably dried out, and is a potential fire hazard.

Caring for Your Tree

Do not place your tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks. Keep cigarette ashes away from the tree. Do not put your live tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.

Disposing of Your Tree

Never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood-burning stove. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly.
