The Master Ballot Position is determined by the Lt. Governor's office in accordance with Utah State Code 20A-6-305.

The 2021 Clinton City Municipal Election will be conducted as Vote by Mail in coordination with the Davis County Clerk/Auditor. For information on Vote by Mail & Voter Registration ([click here](#)). For those who wish to vote early, ballots can be dropped off in a secure drop box in the Recreation Department parking lot 1651 W 2300 N prior to the election. All drop off ballot boxes are open whether the city is having an election or not. Voters can deposit ballots in the drop boxes anytime up until 8:00 pm on Election Day. If voters put their ballot in the mail, it is recommended that they mail it by the Friday before the Election. It must be postmarked on or before the Monday before the Election to be counted. For those who wish to vote in person, a polling location will be available at Clinton City Recreation on August 10, 2021 for the Primary Election and on Nov 2, 2021 for the General Election from 7 am to 8pm.


Club #55 Luncheon

PROPERTY TAX INCREASE FOR PARAMEDICS

Your property tax notices have arrived. You'll see an increase for Clinton City. It's the one I've been telling you about on social media, on the website, and in the city newsletter. It's the first tax increase we've had by the city since 2014 (which was for streets). This one is to start our own paramedics program.

Remember, the county is ending their paramedics service, but they will retain much of the money associated with their program, because they aren't laying off their paramedics. The paramedics are the same people who also do law enforcement for the Sheriff's Office. They are keeping those deputies on payroll so they can boost patrol. So, we will get a little money back from the cancellation of the county service, but not enough to cover the six full-time paramedics Clinton will need to hire.

That's why we have no choice but to do a tax increase. All the cities in Davis County are in a similar boat. It's the right choice, because this new arrangement will lead to a much-needed expansion of both paramedics service and law enforcement service across the entire county. It's the result of two years of collaboration among all 15 cities, all fire departments and districts, and the county.

Including the new increase, Clinton will be bringing in \$2.7 million citywide annually from property taxes. That's a fraction of the \$11.8 million it takes to run Clinton. **September 1 - Secondary Water Shutdown
(Extreme Drought Conditions)**

Due to the extreme drought, water use, and limited resources, the Davis and Weber Counties Canal Company will shut their secondary water systems off on September 1, 2021 or sooner if water use increases. Please reduce your secondary water use, limit watering to twice a week, and plan accordingly for this early shutdown (please no new landscapes). Please do not create a cross-connection which will jeopardize drinking water systems.

WATERING SCHEDULE: If your house number ends in:

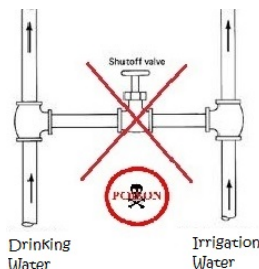
- 0, 1, 2, 3 - Water on Monday and Thursday
- 4, 5, 6 - Water on Tuesday and Friday
- 7, 8, 9 - Water on Wednesday and Saturday

It is recommended that you water once (one cycle) on your scheduled day EXCEPT between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. We recommend reviewing the State website for conservation ideas and guides (<http://www.conservewater.utah.gov/>) and check www.davisweber.org, for further updates or restrictions. We ask for your patience as we manage an unprecedented water situation. Thank you, the Davis and Weber Counties Canal Company (DWCCC).

WATER CROSS CONNECTIONS

Due to the drought, you may be tempted to connect your pressure irrigation system (automatic sprinklers) to your culinary (drinking) water supply system. **DON'T DO IT!!** Secondary and Culinary water systems are two completely separate piping systems, connecting the two is illegal and dangerous to the culinary water distribution system throughout the City. This kind of cross connection is a Class C Misdemeanor and will also result in an immediate turn off of our culinary water. If you feel you must provide some water to your landscape, use a hose connected to your house's outdoor culinary water spigot. However, please do not use too much, as culinary water is metered and is precious during this drought period.



Warning!

This is an illegal cross-connection and it is also very dangerous! Never ever connect the drinking water piping to the secondary piping. The pressure in the secondary water system is higher than the pressure in the drinking water system and the secondary water will be forced into the drinking water line.

TIPS FROM OUR COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT) FOR EXTREME DROUGHT CONDITIONS

- Please follow water restrictions & suggestions provided by the Davis and Weber Counties Canal Company and our city officials.
- Reduce Secondary water use to twice a week and follow the watering schedule identified on page 3 of this newsletter.
- No watering between 10 am and 6pm. This is the hottest time of day and the water will just evaporate and not soak into the roots of grass, plants, trees & shrubs.
- Wash your car at night on top of the grass. Use a bucket and a nozzle on the hose. Shut off the water between rinsing. If you use a carwash, choose one that recycles the water.
- Capture cold water as you wait for it to turn warm and then use the water to water your plants or refrigerate it for drinking water.
- Don't leave water running while shaving, brushing teeth, washing your face, or lathering up in the shower. Get wet, turn the water off, lather up, then turn the water back on to rinse off.
- Make sure your home is free of water leaks. Put a few drops of food color in the toilet tank and see if it is leaking into the bowl.
- Run the dishwasher only when it's full or wash dishes by hand.
- Wash only full-loads of clothes at a time. Adjust your washer to proper load size.
- When watering outside, adjust your sprinklers to water the grass and not the sidewalk and street. Prevent our precious water from running down the gutters.
- If there is a rain storm, put an empty tuna can outside. If it rains long enough to fill the tuna can then you should have enough water in the ground to last almost a week without re-watering the grass.

CONNEXT FIBER IS COMING TO CLINTON. Connex will begin installing fiber cable throughout the City in a few months. They are asking residents to complete a questionnaire at www.connexbroadband.com (under the "Check Availability" tab – choose Clinton) to help them decide on a plan to build the neighborhoods where there is the most interest first! Submitting the form and encouraging your neighbors to do the same will help Connex develop their plan for installation.

A friendly reminder that recreational vehicles are **not** permitted to be parked on city streets for more than 24 hours (see City Code Title 16 Chapter 7(21)). Recreational vehicle (RV) includes but are not limited to, travel trailers, camping trailers, motor homes, or fifth wheel trailers. If preparing for a trip with your RV requires parking in the street for more than 24 hours, you must obtain prior approval from the Police Department. Please call (801) 614-0800 or after hours non-emergency dispatch at (801) 451-4151. Parking of recreational vehicles, travel or camping trailers, or fifth wheels must be on a hard-surface (or concrete). Overhang of the vehicle onto sidewalks is also in violation of City Code.

2000 WEST 1300 NORTH INTERSECTION

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PUBLIC WORKS

Please remember it is the homeowner's responsibility to maintain all trees and shrubs in their park strip. Please keep them trimmed up so the street sweeper and snow plows can get by. The City Code (25-16-5) states: "All shrubs and trees shall be pruned to permit plain view of regulatory (street and stop) and caution signs, utility accesses, and so that they do not overhang the curb in the street twelve (12) feet or the sidewalk eight (8) feet."
